### c) Committee Reports – Co. Rittenhouse

1) Reported that it was his recommendation as well as two of the three members of his committee was that the borough continue to use Helmetta Animal Shelter based upon reports received from the Board of Health, County Health Officials, Police Department and State SPCA which found nothing wrong nor cruelty to any of the animals. The deficiencies they found were two construction items, which are being addressed and fixed. He said that they are also working on the record keeping issues. They are posting more animal photographs. Their main concern was the health of the residents of Sayreville. He said that he was aware that Co. Novak objected to what he said as he spoke with her this morning.

Councilwoman Novak said that she received the report on Friday and read it on Saturday. She said that she has a problem with it having her name on this committee report stating that the committee met and they did not. She commented on their "non" record keeping and the number of OPRA requests and the replies. She said she feels that the facility cannot handle the 21 towns that they service. She further commented on the "non" cleanliness of the shelter; the non spaying/neutering; inoculations not being given to the animals that are adopted out; the lack of vet services; record keeping, she continued reading e-mails. She spoke about the shared services with Helmetta.

Councilman Rittenhouse said that he spoke with various people today and they are working to correct the issues that were found at Helmetta. He spoke about the borough's ability to get someone else to provide the same services at the same costs or less and the length of time, a notice would have to be provided. He also commented that due to the controversy various vets stated that they probably do not want to work in a town with that controversy.

Councilwoman Novak asked Councilwoman Eicher if she agreed with the report and recommendation. Councilwoman Eicher said that until they find a better and more cost effective place she does agree with the recommendation and report.

A more lengthily discussion followed.

Mayor commented on the licensing requirements. He said that he took a poll at Sayreville Day and found that the residents do not want to pay more for Animal Shelter Serves and have their taxes increased to do so.

Mayor recommend the Board of Health put together a set of specs on what they are looking for and a RFQ will be formulated and sent out with all the rest of professional services we appoint the 1<sup>st</sup> of the year.

Mayor further spoke about what the cost factor would be if these services were brought back to our town.

Co. McGill spoke about certain words being used to lightly such as "radical". He then asked about the shared construction services with Helmetta. Mayor responded on this Shared Service.

WHEREAS, the Pilot Program will likely have a negative impact on the funds received by the Board through the local tax assessments; and

WHEREAS, the Pilot Program will add an unidentified number of students to the school district without the benefit of increased tax revenue that would enable the Board to support those students; and

WHEREAS, increased enrollment without the benefit of increased tax support may require the Board to cut programs and staff or increase taxes on residents outside of the Pilot Program; and

WHEREAS, despite assertions to the contrary, the Council did not consult with the Board or any representative thereof regarding the Pilot Program prior to the Council's approval of the Pilot Program;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED that the Board hereby requests that the Council consult with the Board in the future prior to taking action that will directly affect the interests of the Board as well as the students and taxpayers of the school district; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Board hereby requests that the Council designate a portion of funds generated through the Pilot Program to be provided to the Board annually to alleviate the impact on the students and taxpayers of the school district.

Mayor asked Councilman Rittenhouse to put together a three person committee along with the appropriate professionals to meet with the Board of Education's counterpart committee to come up with a formula as they had requested.

Mayor said that he would also like to entertain a motion of process that in the future before this council passes any pilot agreement it would first go before the board of education for review and comment. Councilman Rittenhouse moved the Mayor's motion. Seconded by Councilwoman Eicher.
