READ IN FULL RESOLUTION #2015-305 A RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF SAYREVILLE IN THE COUNTY OF MIDDLESEX, STATE OF NEW JERSEY

WHEREAS, one of the most pressing financial problems facing the State of New Jersey is the potential insolvency of the state pension fund which is currently experiencing a shortfall of many millions of dollars; and

WHEREAS, this is a very serious matter because the State has a moral and legal obligation to meet its pension obligations, especially for those workers who are already retired or nearing retirement; and

WHEREAS, a contributing factor to serious problems facing the pension fund is the practice of politicians who significantly pad their future pensions by accepting political patronage jobs late in their careers that they are often unqualified to hold; and

WHEREAS, one glaring example of this kind of political patronage pension padding involves the Borough of Sayreville where Mayor Kennedy O'Brien has recently accepted a job in the State Department of Corrections which will result in his pension increasing by a factor of twenty times; and for which he does not meet the stated qualifications; and

WHEREAS, the Borough Council would like to state our opposition to pension padding patronage job like Mayor O'Brien's which are an unfair burden to taxpayers and one of the reasons why average people lose faith in their government.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Governing Body hereby calls on our State, Legislature and Governor to reform the state pension system and put an end to pension padding patronage positions like Mayor O'Brien's.

Mayor asked the Borough Engineer to report on the article that was in the newspaper about the flood walls.

- Mr. Cornell responded that the MCUA is receiving grant money for the modifications to the pumping stations on Canal Street and in Edison. They are constructing flood walls around it and also emergency generators so that we do not have problems like we did during Hurricane Sandy, where the sewerage backed up into the streets.
- Resident from Boehmhurst Avenue questioned the gate and berm on Boehmhurst being opened up to traffic.

Mayor asked Sgt. Bartlinski to address the resident.

- Sgt. John Bartlinski reported that over one year ago a letter came to the council about some residents requesting that Boehmhurst Avenue be opened to Sayreville Blvd. He said that it is the recommendation of the Police Dept. at this time that the road be modified with some sort of gate so that the road could be opened only in an emergency.

He said that if the road were to be opened permanently, it would be open to nothing. There would be more traffic on Boehmhurst Avenue; one portion of Sayreville Blvd. could become a raceway; illegal dumping and be a place for people to gather.

Questions from a resident from the pew (inaudible). All questions were answered by Sgt. Bartlinski.

Sgt. Bartlinski informed the Mayor that he will have a thing called a speed spy indicating traffic and speed in either direction.

• EXECUTIVE SESSION - None

PUBLIC PORTION

At this time Mayor O'Brien opened the meeting to the public or any and all issues.

Those appearing were:

- Louise Einhorn, School Traffic Guard.

Representing herself and the other crossing guards.

Requested the council's consideration in a pay raise. Stated that they are the lowest paid crossing guards in the surrounding towns. Last per diem raise was 16 years ago. And that there are some inefficiencies.

Some posts are dangerous. They are out there in the rain, snow, ice, heat, etc.

Mayor asked for Sgt. Bartlinski to send reports to ensure better safety for the guards as well as his recommendation on how to compensate and equalize the crossing guard pay scale.

Sgt. Bartlinski stated that he has made these recommendations for over the past three years.

Mayor asked that he forward them to the Clerk for distribution in the next packet.

• Jorge Gonzalez, Sayreville Housing authority
Commented on the 72/80 Unit mixed use senior project they have been discussing for a few weeks now. He said that the Mayor asked that it go before the Planning Board for consideration for those numbers to be included in their COAH Plan. He said that the Planning Board at this stage is only advisory to the council, SERA stated that the area could be included as an area of need of redevelopment. He said that the decision lies with the Mayor and Council to move the project forward by adopting a resolution to allow the Housing Authority to discuss a long term lease.

Mayor asked him if he had a plan, ie, what are the salary ceilings that a person has to meet in order to qualify to move into a facility that he is proposing, the size of the unit has not been discussed or the rent. He also stated that he would like the affected residents of the area to be involved in this process.

Mr. Gonzalez said that the funding is coming from the entire state through NJHMFA. He then asked the council if they could pass a resolution placing this property in need of redevelopment for further study and negotiate a long term lease with the Borough through the Mayor and Council.

Mr. DuPont stated that he would speak with the engineer after this meeting and Councilman McGill said that he would have to review the resolution.

 Mike D'Addio, 13 Zaleski Drive SERA Chairman

Stated that SERA Commissioners have reviewed the issue and has recommended that this area be placed in a redevelopment zone if that is what the council desires. Any resolution that should come from the council at this point is placing the property in a redevelopment zone. Then you decide if this is what you would like to have built there and then plans would come back to SERA for consideration, then a redevelopment plan, Housing Authority would then appoint a redeveloper.

- Jorge Gongalez, Chairman Housing Authority
 Stated that they would be helping the residents of the Borough of
 Sayreville.
- Commented on illegal leases and evictions and upset that Councilwoman Kilpatrick neglected to respond to his phone calls. He then stated that his hearing has been scheduled for Oct. 19, 2015 he then said that the decision that is going to be rendered at this Rent Control Hearing needs a Landlord Tennant Attorney Specialist because this decision is going to affect 35% of this community in accordance with the Rent Control Ordinance. He asked that in addition to Mr. DuPont that a Landlord Tennant Attorney specialist attend this rent control board meeting to help the board render a decision in this matter.

Mr. Petersen said that Legal Services of New Jersey offered to supply Sayreville with a recommendation as well as Catholic Charities and the NJ Tenants Organization.

Mayor said that he spoke with some of the members of the Rent Leveling Board and there are areas in the Ordinance that they are unfamiliar with as they are appointed volunteers and that this is the first time they ever had to deal with such an issue. He asked if there is a motion to appoint an expert in Rent/Tennant laws.

Motion made by Councilman Rittenhouse to seek recommendations from the NJ Tenants Organization for these matters. Seconded by Councilwoman Kilpatrick.

Councilman Buchanan questioned how much this attorney would be paid for his services.

Mayor asked Councilman Rittenhouse if there could be an amendment to the motion to include a not to exceed figure of \$3,000.00. Both Councilmembers agreed and the motion is amended to seek recommendations from the NJ Tenants Organization, Catholic Charities or the Legal Services of New Jersey and that they be paid for their services at a rate not to exceed \$3,000.00. Mayor asked the Borough Attorney to follow through with this motion.

Mr. DuPont said that there is only three days until the hearing and the hearing will probably have to be rescheduled. After an attorney is selected the Mayor and Council will have to approve, so this will take time.

Business Administrator Mr. Frankel suggested in order to save time that we check "other" attorneys the council appointed at the beginning of the year to see if they have this expertise. Mayor did not agree because these attorneys are general attorneys covering general topics.
